CCCD, a Thermostat for Deaf Empowerment and Development cont'd

CCCD is an institution that seeks to create a favourable environment for Deaf persons to live a thriving life in Jamaica like a thermostat! Currently, the Deaf continue to experience challenges when it comes to accessing a number of services and support.

CCCD over the years has sought to take a proactive approach to resolving issues rather than waiting to see what others will do. The creation of a Continuing Adult Deaf Education (CADE) programme allows Deaf adults to further their education and acquire higher certification beyond the secondary education system. CADE is a prime example of our thermostat stance - we create it because it is needed. Helping adults to adjust to the realities of independent living in Jamaica has been made possible through our Transitional Living Programme (TLP) at the Jamaica Deaf Village.

Our intentional and strategic REACH Campaign has helped to heighten the public awareness about CCCD, resulting in increased public engagement and student enrollment in our primary and secondary schools at our Kingston and Knockpatrick campuses. We have seen one of the highest enrollment in recent times!

Our thermostat needle continues to steadily go up knowing there are those who need to be connected to the Good News of Jesus Christ. CCCD has created many ways for the Deaf Community to learn about the gospel. Many Deaf individuals have come to know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour through Christian education and discipleship, worship sessions held on our campuses and the outreach and ministerial activities at the New Life Church for the Deaf.

I encourage all who read this newsletter to continue supporting this ministry with your resources and prayers. God ordained its establishment sixty-five (65) years ago and it continues to serve its purpose to this day. We are happy you are on this journey with us and we look forward to you remaining as CCCD soars to higher heights mindful of its purpose.





RED CROSS FARM PROJECT


The campus received a solar water pump and water tanks from the Red Cross farm project, which continues to flourish in

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CCCD /RISE/EU IMPROVED FORESTRY MANAGEMENT AND LIVELIHOODS FOR BETTER JAMAICA PROJECT

JAMAICA DEAF

LLAGE

The implementation of CCCD /RISE/EU Improved Forestry Management and Livelihoods for Better Jamaica Project ended as of May 2023. Twelve (12) acres of fruit, ornamental and lumber trees have been planted, thirty (30) Deaf and Hard of Hearing participants have been trained in bamboo craft making and bag sewing.

Under the forestry project, a total of 1300 seedlings (700 timber, 400 fruits and 200 ornamentals) have been procured and planted on 12 acres of land; 10 acres at JDV (1100) and 2 acres at Knockpatrick (200). Four climate change awareness and sensitization training sessions were held across all CCCD campuses. A total of 140 people were trained.

A tree planting and tree flagging labour day (May 23, 2023) event was hosted in partnership with the Central Jamaica Social Development Initiative. The event was also used to facilitate hearing persons becoming aware of Deaf culture, basic JSL and providing an opportunity for hearing and Deaf interaction/integration.

FACILITY RENTALS LOOKING PROMISING

Agriculture on the JDV campus continues to be stymied by lack of irrigable water, and the prevailing drought. JDV is actively pursuing the procurement of a new of tractor in collaboration with Hood Daniel (Tractor Dealership). The process is taking longer than we anticipated but we remain hopeful that the process will yield fruit soonest and we will have that new tractor for expanded farming activities on the campus.

Cattle herd size grew from 38 to 42 since our last update in 2021. Twelve calves were sold for this year. The JDV has started preparatory work for the construction of a goat house. This marks the start of activities for small ruminant production on the campus.
