

The Foundation of Transition Must be God's Word

As we reflect on Joshua 1, verse 8, "keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it", as a team we must understand how important it is for us to follow suit. The CCCD family is encouraged, as I am encouraged, to have daily meditation on the Word so we can hear from God clearly as He instructs us each step of the way.

The Transitional Efforts are Active and not Passive

Any kind of transition comes with difficulty both for an individual or a group. CCCD is no different. The children of Israel and Joshua had to be deliberate about the journey they took to the destiny that was promised to them. A NEW DIGITAL WORKSPACE FROM NCB

The approximately forty (40) student at CCCD Montego Bay are now better equipped for training and integration into the digital workforce following the installation of the school's new computer room by the National Commercial Bank Foundation.

The new digital space was created as part of the foundation's activities for Labour Day in May which was held this year under the national theme "Re-igniting a Nation for Greatness".

In addition to the computer room, which comes equipped with three new desktop computers, a printer with related accessories, and three desks and chairs, the NCB Foundation's volunteers worked together with members of the Jamaica Defence Force (JDF). They did landscaping work on the campus' lawn, painting of a corridor near the computer room, and clearing out debris from other classrooms.



THE JDV: A \$50 MILLION HAVEN FOR TREES

On World Forest Day, March 21, 2022, a joint initiative of CCCD and RISE Life Management Services, funded by the European Union, was launched at the JDV. Imagine! Our campus is to be the place for this multi-million dollar arboretum (a botanical garden devoted to trees)! The project is known as the Improved Forest Management and Livelihoods (IFMAL) initiative.

We look forward to the years ahead as seedlings will take root to form the ten acre arboretum which will be filled with approximately three thousand (3000) indigenous Jamaican timber, ornamental, and fruit trees educational and recreational purposes by September 2023.

This is a revolutionary project and we are glad that it is coming from the Deaf Community. We will not only be engaging in tree planting activities but as a means of sustaining the livelihoods of our Deaf families and our organisation as a whole, the project will include climate resilient agriculture, Deaf craft production, sustainable natural resources management and awareness in forestry management, climate change mitigation and adaptation strategies. It looks like it will be a win/win situation for us and the environment.

Since the project launch, we have already planted over 600 trees and organized bamboo craft training sessions for Deaf women.

We were able to secure funds to purchase a tractor and a bus for agricultural expansion and life team transportation respectively.

We continue with our Dryer Angels production as we seek how to meet potential increased quota demands. This enterprise area continues to be the major earner of revenue for JDV and enables the campus to meet its salary and other financial obligations.

We hosted LIFE teams over the period with 4 (four) additional teams planned for December 2022. The relaxation of COVID-19 restrictions has resulted in increased LIFE Team bookings and visits to the campus. We have hosted four (4) teams since January 2022. Additionally, facility rentals are showing positive signs post COVID 19 challenges. We continue to prepare for the increased uptake.

Agriculture continues to be stymied by the lack of irrigable water and climate related drought. We are actively pursuing well drilling possibilities. Initial steps have been taken to investigate and engage public and private stakeholders towards making this a reality. Cattle herd size grew from 38-42 since our last update in 2021.
