Members of New Life Church and the deaf community attended the thanksgiving service of Miss Barbra Dale at Cheapside District New Testament Church in Manchester.






NEW LIFE CHURCH FOR THE DEAF CONT'D




Our school term ended with our Christmas banquet and Ms. CCCD Pageant on December 19. The theme was "Winter Wonderland".



We now have a brand new vehicle to help us better serve our L.I.F.E teams and carry out necessary tasks. It is a 2023 Toyota Hiace bus. We want to say a hearty thank you to our church partners overseas who made this acquisition possible through their kind donations, namely, the North Branch Reformed Smithville Apostolic Church and the Rittman Apostolic Church Williamson Chapel FUMC.

Dryer angels production continues amid potential reduction in per unit cost paid by the customer. This reduction in per unit cost will negatively impact the overall profitability of the enterprise. Nonetheless, this enterprise area continues to be the major earner of revenue for JDV and enables the campus to meet its salary and other financial obligations. With the proposed per unit cost diversifying, we are looking into other sewing possibilities.





Great news! We hosted twelve (12) L.I.F.E. teams over the period with a significant increase in projected teams for 2023. With the lull in COVID-19 and its associated travel restrictions, we can expect to have increased L.I.F.E. team bookings and visits to our campus for 2023. Additionally, facility rentals also increasing and we also anticipate more business next year.

The CCCD /RISE/EU Improved Forestry Management and Livelihoods for Better Jamaica Project continues. Since its implementation in March, a total of 1,146 trees (608 timber, 382 fruits & 176 ornamentals) have been procured and planted on approximately 11 acres of land: 9.5 acres at JDV (946) and 1.5 acres at Knockpatrick (200). Thirty (30) Deaf and Hard of Hearing persons were trained in bamboo craft and bag sewing. Fifteen (15) Deaf trainers have been trained in Climate Change awareness.





Successfully conducted sewing and bamboo craft training sessions could mean the emergence of two new enterprise initiatives. They are a bamboo craft business to supply the Sandals resorts and a US gift shop along with a sewing venture to produce school physical education gears. Both prospects are promising and would increase the income generating streams for CCCD.

We continue to struggle with agricultural efforts because of a lack of irrigable water, a tractor for land preparation activities and climate related drought. We are looking into purchasing a new tractor to help bolster agriculture production on the campus. We are also actively pursuing well drilling possibilities. We are awaiting a proposal from a well drilling company to explore the possibility and feasibility of drilling a well on the campus. On a more positive note, cattle herd size grew from 38 to 42 since our last update in 2021 and twelve calves were sold this year.

Other Highlights



The CCCD/ Red Cross Jamaica Water Management and Climate Smart Agriculture Project costing \$7,888,115.04 commenced in November 2022. It is a three phased project aimed at bringing improvement to Knockpatrick's farming programme including:

- repairing a catchment area for increased water harvesting and storage.
- installation of four (40 (1,000 gallons) water storage tanks.
- installing solar powered automated drip irrigation system.

CCCD hosted a health fair on August 1, 2022 as part of our public awareness campaign. For our first time and considering there were other competing events since it was Emancipation Day, we believe the event went well. We registered 146 persons and most of them were able to check their weight, blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol levels. They were also able to see the doctor we had on duty and the audiologists or at least just the audiologists. Another health fair is being planned to take place in 2023 at our Kingston campus.

Other Highlights

CCCD partnered with students from the Management of Meetings and Events 2022 class at the University of Technology (UTECH).
